Spanish Spelling Bee - London Competition

As languages are a key element in the GCSE curriculum, the MFL team entered St Paul's into the Spanish Spelling Bee Competition for students in Year 7, for the second year running. It is a national competition for students studying a foreign language, allowing students to practise and improve their vocabulary, spelling and memory skills. During the competition, students translate words from English and spell them out loud in Spanish.

The London Competition took place on Thursday 4th May, after students had been preparing for months (learning 150 words in Spanish!). Amaal Karshe, Ekaterina Penova and Favour Diya performed brilliantly and the atmosphere was thrilling. The level of competition was extremely high. Even though they did not make it through to the final, we should not forget that they flew through the initial round of 9,050 students to compete today against 125 students.

Year 7 Students collect for local Foodbank

At the beginning of this half-term our Year 7 students attended an assembly presented by the CEO of the charity First Love Foundation and a special guest who has greatly benefited from the work of this charity. First Love Foundation give food, support and advice to local people in the Tower Hamlets community who are in crisis. Each person is given an emergency donation of food (enough for 3 days) and the help they need to resolve their crisis. All food is donated by the local community via schools, churches, individuals, businesses and at supermarket collections. They believe that emergency food support is only the first step in someone's journey out of crisis.

Our Year 7 students listened intently as Denise Bentley (CEO) and Lorna Scully shared with them their powerful, sincere and thought provoking stories of both struggle and triumph over adversity. Both of our guests were humbled by the welcome they received from our students, right through to the kindness and attentiveness which they were shown, saying how 'it was an honour and pleasure' for them to visit St Paul's Academy.

As a result of this inspiring assembly, our students were motivated in their challenge to collect as many items of both food and toiletries as possible for our local foodbank in Thamesmead throughout the season of Lent. Over the course of the Lenten season, our Year 7 students, along with a number of our Year 10 and 11 vInspired student volunteers, worked tirelessly to collect and donate as many items as possible. Each Friday after school our student volunteers counted and kept a detailed record of all of the items which were collected each week. This helped us to focus our collection much better and make sure that we were providing our foodbank with the essential items that they needed. It is with great delight and pride that we are able to report that we have managed to collect a total of 413 items during this time! This is a fantastic effort and one which will make a huge difference to the lives of so many people in our local community. The representatives from the Thamesmead Foodbank were so grateful for all of our hard work and generosity.

Collecting for our local foodbank has been an extremely worthwhile experience for both staff and students and one which we hope to do again in the near future. Our Year 10 and 11 vInspired Student Volunteers now look forward to visiting the First Love Foundation headquarters in Tower Hamlets to see first-hand the fantastic work which this charity organisation does.

Thank you to everyone who has helped to support this extremely worthwhile initiative. We hope that it is something which we can help to support again in the near future and illustrate once again our St Paul's Academy ethos of Faith in Action

First Love Foundation Foodbank Visit

Following our very own foodbank collection during the season of Lent, eight of our Year 10 and 11 Inspired Volunteer Student Ambassadors were invited to spend the afternoon of 28th April at the offices of the First Love Foundation in Tower Hamlets. What inspired our students to work towards collecting for our local foodbank in Thamesmead was the inspirational work of those at the First Love Foundation. The First Love Foundation is a foodbank based in Tower Hamlets, one of London's most deprived boroughs. However, it is no ordinary foodbank and during our visit, CEO Denise Bentley explained her foundations vision, impact and new approach to foodbanks:

'First Love Foundation is about the whole person, not just hunger. Loving whole people in actions and in truth has driven us to expand on what it means to be a foodbank. It is impossible to see the effects of food crisis and feel satisfied with just handing out food. We took the time to find out what caused the crisis in the first place – for every person who visited our foodbank. Then we adapted to address all these needs.'

In order to reach out and help as many people as possible in Tower Hamlets, Denise and her team rely on the help of referring partner agencies who are able to spot and refer those most in need to the foodbank. As well as providing much needed emergency food, the work of the First Love Foundation reaches far beyond this service, providing advice and support as well as help with employment to all those who walk through their door.

Our student ambassadors listened intently to Denise as she presented to them the amazing work of her foundation and her vision for the future:

'We have a vision for a more resilient Tower Hamlets. Not satisfied with just handing out food, we have a 5 year plan to decrease the number of people needing emergency food support ever again. Over the next 3 years

we aim to increase the number of people living sustainable lives'

Denise and her team took time to answer the many meaningful and thought provoking questions of our students. As our volunteer ambassadors gained a much greater understanding of the work of the First Love Foundation it began to open up their eyes to the potential impact that their actions, help and support can have on those in their community.

Feeling inspired and with our students' 'brain juices' flowing overtime, pupils were then given the fantastic opportunity to help sort out all of the food in the warehouse of the First Love Foundation. This was a challenge our students relished and in true St Paul's style managed to sort through all of the 300kg of food and toiletries in record time; all done with constant laughter and a permanent smile on the faces of all of our ambassadors.

Being given the opportunity to engage with, as well as see and hear, the tremendous impact that the work of a charity organisation such as the First Love Foundation can have on a community truly inspired each and every one of our students. The experience enabled pupils to realise their own potential and how they can use their own skills and qualities to make a real difference to the lives of others. Here is what some of our students had to say:

'Going to First Love Foundation was such an incredible and heart-warming experience. I learnt so much about poverty and what causes it as well as what other people such as those who work at the First Love Foundation do in order to help them through it and it's so inspiring. I learnt that helping people come out of poverty is not all about providing food but also providing the necessary support in helping them find a job and make them more self-sufficient which is what I saw at the foundation. It was very fun and I really enjoyed helping to sort out the food with my peers and teacher. I will never forget this day as it has definitely opened my eyes to a lot of things' (Lora Umelue, Year 11).

'I'm very proud of myself to know that I'm

having a great impact on other people's lives' (Stephen Ola-Oni, Year 11).

'Today was a very eye opening experience, I had a chance to view the hard work behind the food bank, specifically the First Love Foundation....I was able to see just how hard people have to work to pack and arrange the donated food, as well as checking for 'miscellaneous' donations (having taken on the role myself alongside my other Inspired team). Before taking on that task, we sat in the conference room to view the appalling statistics, as we gazed on outside of the building, you see the visual segregation of the wealthy people in the Canary Wharf buildings right next to the deprived town of Tower Hamlets. Personally that was the real hard hitting fact that sustainability could be in arms reach yet so far away' (Verona Okine, Year 11).

'It's a life-changing experience for me' (Dylan Wiggan, Year 11).

Before leaving our students enjoyed some homemade 'patties' and chocolate cake which they had brought along as a gift for Denise and her team while picking Denise's brain one final time. Denise and her team were truly blown away by the unbelievable volunteering work, personalities, self-belief and drive of all of our students and the passion they display for helping others. Denise told Miss Duffy, our Inspired Schools Co-Ordinator:

'Your students are special, truly special and inspirational and I will never forget them, you should be so proud.'

Miss Duffy resonates every word Denise says and could not be more proud of each and every one of her student ambassadors:

'The tremendous amount of volunteering work completed by our students simply exemplifies our schools belief of the importance of 'Faith in Action'. I am beaming with pride when I reflect on everything they have achieved and the insurmountable impact they have had on all those around them to date.'

Denise was so impressed by our students that she has invited them to help with a summer scheme project which she is delivering in Tower Hamlets. This is an opportunity which our students are extremely excited about embarking on. All at St Paul's would like to thank Denise and all of her team at the First Love Foundation for providing our students with this wonderful, insightful opportunity and look forward to continuing to work alongside them in the near future.




Step into Dance 2017

This event meant the first outing for the SPA Geography and Peabody Ambassadors from Year 11 and 10. They teamed up with Thames21 staff (Jess Becher, Joanna Barton and Chris Rose) with Mr Davis and Diana Webb to work on the Thames Road Wetland. The group was split in two; one group was led by Chris, who waded into the Thames Wetland marsh to pick up plastic and an array of tyres. The other group, led by Jess and Joanna, picked up rubbish on the walk-way running parallel along the River Cray. Mr Davis and Diana were no onlookers. They worked on the rubbish in the river that had been trapped by a fallen tree. They were even able to remove a wooden pallet and garden fence from the waterway.

A further 20 car tyres were also removed from the area. Most of this litter had been there for some time so the improvements have been made permanent. We were also fortunate enough to be mentioned on the Bexley Wildlife website for our contributions.
